### **Dennis Gormley**

#### **Senior Research Fellow at the University of Pittsburgh's Matthew B. Ridgway Center for International Security Studies**

Dennis M. Gormley is a Senior Research Fellow at the University of Pittsburgh's Matthew B. Ridgway Center for International Security Studies and a member of the faculty of the Graduate School of Public and International Affairs at the University of Pittsburgh. From 2003 to 2009 Mr. Gormley was a Senior Fellow at the James Martin Center for Nonproliferation Studies in Washington, D.C. Mr. Gormley served as a senior vice president for 20 years with Pacific-Sierra Research (PSR), where he founded PSR's Military Operations and Policy Analysis Group. He was twice affiliated with the International Institute for Strategic Studies in London as a Research Associate in 1984 and a Consulting Senior Fellow in 2002. Mr. Gormley has chaired or served on many Department of Defense and intelligence advisory panels; most recently on a panel assisting the Deputy Director of National Intelligence (Analysis) plan and implement the 9/11 Commission's recommendations for improving intelligence integration. He frequently furnishes expert testimony to Congress and has served as a consultant to Sandia National Laboratories and the RAND Corporation, among many others. Before joining PSR in 1979, he was head of foreign intelligence at the U.S. Army's Harry Diamond Laboratories in Washington, D.C. Mr. Gormley received a BA and MA in history from the University of Connecticut in 1965 and 1966 and attended Officer Candidate School at Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Maryland, where he was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the U.S. Army Ordnance Corps, serving on active duty from 1966 to 1969. He is the author of three books, the most recent of which is *Missile Contagion: Cruise Missile Proliferation and the Threat to International Security* (Praeger, 2008), while his journal articles have appeared in *Survival*, the *Washington Quarterly*, the *Bulletin of the Atomic Scientists*, *Nonproliferation Review*, *Orbis*, and many others.
