Lynn Eden

Lynn Eden is acting co-director and a senior research scholar at the Center for International Security and Cooperation, Freeman Spogli Institute for International Studies, Stanford University. She is also co-chair of U.S. Pugwash. Eden received her Ph.D. in sociology from the University of Michigan and taught in the Department of History at Carnegie Mellon University before going to Stanford. Eden's first book, Crisis in Watertown was a finalist for a National Book Award. Her second, Witness in Philadelphia, about the murders of civil rights workers Schwerner, Chaney, and Goodman was a Book of the Month Club Alternate Selection. In the area of international security, Eden focuses on U.S. foreign and military policy, organizational issues, and the social construction of science and technology in the nuclear realm. She co-edited, with Steven E. Miller, Nuclear Arguments. Eden was an editor of The Oxford Companion to American Military History, which takes a social and cultural perspective on war and peace in U.S. history; the volume was chosen as a Main Selection of the History Book Club. Eden's most recent book, Whole World on Fire: Organizations, Knowledge, and Nuclear Weapons Devastation won the American Sociological Association's 2004 Robert K. Merton award for best book in science. knowledge and technology. Eden is currently working on projects on learning from exercises for homeland security; intelligence failures before September 11; and how, over the past sixty years, U.S. military officers and civilian officials have explained to themselves and to the public the goals and meaning of U.S. nuclear war planning.
